2015-2016 RESULTS

The FCEF's membership and good standing with the Consortium of Florida Education Foundations and Florida State Take Stock in Children Organization (FSTC) enables the Flagler School District to apply for special grants and gain access to matching dollars. In this school year over \$146,000 were contributed as a result of FECF's engagement with the Consortium and FSTC.

In 2015-16, FCEF added twelve new board members strengthening our community connections for students in key career industries including hospitality, real estate, manufacturing and medicine.

The FCEF and the Flagler School District held their 2nd Annual Classroom to Careers Symposium to engage and inform more than 60 executive business leaders in Flagler County.

The Florida State Take Stock in Children awarded the FCEF the Take Stock in Children Program Silver Excellence Award.

Bunnell Elementary was recognized for its campus garden with the state Golden Shovel Award; the project was funded with a FCEF Innovations Grant.

Flagler Palm Coast High School's i3 New Tech Academy was one of only ten recipients (out of 67 districts) awarded a Motorola STEM grant.



ince its inception in 1990 Flagler **County Education Foundation (FCEF)** has empowered innovation in Flagler County Public schools by providing grants for classroom projects that engage students and prepare them for the challenges and opportunities in the 21st century. Over the past three years, more than \$180,000 has been awarded to teachers who are driving innovation in their schools. FCEF funds have made a huge impact in the development of "Classroom to Careers" Flagship programs at each school that encourage students to explore a variety of careers in industries identified as important to economic development in Flagler County.

Today's classroom is quickly replacing paper, pencil and chalkboard with an electronic device for each student, real-time global communications via satellite, classroom furniture that fosters collaboration and strong community partnerships. Public dollars simply do not stretch to meet the needs of our future leaders. The Flagship programs are developing a pipeline of STEM-literate workers who have both the technical and soft skills needed to thrive in college and careers.

"The Hangar" is equipped with the latest technology and classroom furniture to facilitate collaborative learning plus a flight simulator and wind tunnel donated by Embry Riddle Aeronautical University (ERAU). Students like Amber Cole are currently dual enrolled, earning ERAU credits while in high school, without leaving Flagler Palm Coast High School campus. Amber's dream is to become a pilot.

The Women's Initiative is just one of hundreds of organizations that are partnering with the foundation by providing event sponsorships, mentoring students/teachers, speaking to classrooms, and providing schools with inkind donations and expertise.

ore than 60% of our students face economic challenges that impact school attendance, participation in extracurricular activities and high school graduation. Last year more than 500 students were homeless, moving from place to place and school to school in search of a place to call home. Flagler County Education Foundation is making a difference by providing students in low income families with college scholarships, mentors, school supplies and essential clothing items.

Last year STUFF Bus provided more than 1,400 students with essential clothing items that included shoes, socks, and underwear. Imagine the relief that a child feels when she is taken to the guidance counselor to select a new pair of shoes from the STUFF Bus closet and returns to class within an hour.

The Take Stock in Children Program provides students like Caitlin Peterson the opportunity to pursue their dreams. Caitlin is currently studying videography at Florida



State University. The Take Stock in Children Program offered Caitlin mentoring and the opportunity to earn a college scholarship. In the last school year, 65 students were enrolled in the Take Stock in Children Scholarship and Mentoring program.

The Josh Crews Writing Project honors the memory of a young writer and story teller who died far too young. Each year for the past four years, students participating in before and

after school writing clubs are invited to have their work published in an anthology called, "Write On." While all students benefit from creative expression, students from low income families often live in marginalized communities whose members don't often have the experience of being heard or acknowledged. The Josh Crews Writing Project creates a space where all students will be heard and praised, both as individuals and members of a school community.
